Inaugural ITS/UCC Seminar - Céad seimineár an Chumainn i bpáirt le Coláiste na hOllscoile Corcaigh To mark the hundreath anniversary of its foundation, the Council of the Irish Texts Society, in conjunction with the Combined Departments of Irish, University College, Cork, decided to initiate an annual

to a single text or collection. The first seminar, held at University College, Cork, on Saturday, 30 October 1999, was organised by a local committee consisting of Professor Pádraig Ó Riain, Dr John Carey, Dr Caoimhín Ó Muirígh, Dr Liam P Ó Murchú and Dr Pádraigín Riggs (Secretrary). The subject was Fled Bricrenn, one of the two volumes published by the Society in 1899.

George Henderson's edition of *Fled Bricrenn*, one of the most important tales of the Ulster Cycle, represents the only full-scale treatment of the text yet to have seen publication.

An international gathering of scholars was invited to discuss FB's status and history as a text, its




seminar dedicated to examining various of the Society's publications in the light of current scholarship, each year's seminar to be devoted

A total of five papers were delivered at the seminar. Dr Petra S Hellmuth (UCC) spoke on 'The Role of Cú Roí in FB', Mr Nicholas Jacobs (Jesus College, Oxford) on 'Parallels between FB and Sir Gawain and the Green Knight', Professor John Koch (Centre for Advanced Welsh and Celtic Studies, National Library of Wales, Aberystwyth) on 'FB's Significance within the Broader Celtic Context', Professor Proinsias Mac Cana (School of Celtic Studies, **Dublin Institute for Advanced** Studies) on 'FB: Linguistic & Textual Issues' and Dr Bernhard Maier (University of Bonn) on 'Comparing



FB with Classical Descriptions of Celts: Parallels. Problems & Pitfalls' Besides some members of the general public, the attendance included both academics and postgraduate students of University College Cork, the New University of Ulster, National University of Ireland Galway and the Dublin Institute for Advanced Studies: and the questions which followed each paper, as well as the discussion which took place after the final presentation, were evidence of the considerable interest in the subject. The occasion proved to be not only extremely worthwhile but also most enjoyable.

Second ITS/UCC Seminar -Seimineár 2000

The second ITS/UCC Seminar will take place at UCC on Saturday, 11 November 2000. Each year's seminar is devoted to a single text or collection in the Society's main series of publications. This year the seminar will be devoted to the work of Dáibhí Ó Bruadair (ITS volumes 11, 13 and 18).

Dáibhí Ó Bruadair (c 1625 - 1698) is a colossus-like figure amongst the Gaelic poets of the second half of the 17th century. The corpus of his literary output is substantial and enjoyed, in its day, the benefit of careful transmission.

Ó Bruadair's poems are not only valuable primary source documents for the political, military and social life of the period, but can also be

read as essentially 17th century meditations or, indeed, as literary constructs in heavily textured and often challenging language.

Editors are currently working on five texts which will form future ITS Main Series publications. The editing of a text is a very demanding task, carried out by editors alongside other work. However, at least two of these texts are close to publication stage. Texts include: Togail Bruidne Da Derga, Life of St Mochuda, and A Critical Selection from the Works of Pádraic Ó Conaire.

Through the recent death of Brian Ó Cuív (1916-1999), Professor Emeritus at the Dublin Institute for Advanced Studies, not only Irish studies, where he had come to be regarded as the doyen of scholars, but also the Irish Texts Society, of whose Council he had been a member since 1984, has suffered a grievous loss.


The son of a Muskerry man, Shán Ó Cuív, who was instrumental in establishing a phonetic system of spelling Irish, Cuman um Letiriú

his scholarship was by no means limited to Modern Irish. Indeed, his specialism was Classical Irish, which he taught for fourteen years at UCD. He was an authority on Bardic verse, and during his time as editor of the learned journals *Éigse* and *Celtica*, he edited many poems. Appointed Professor at UCD in 1960, he moved to a Senior Professorship at the Institute in 1967, where he also served as Director. He retired in 1988.

Shímplí, Brian followed his father's example in spelling his surname. Moreover, despite his own birth in Dublin, he never wavered in his loyalty to his father's county of Cork which extended even to an active interest in the fortunes of its sporting representatives in various codes, including soccer.

Brian's first major publication was devoted to the Irish of West Muskerry in County Cork, the dialect he had himself learnt as a child. But despite his many publications on that subject, and his abiding interest in An tAthair Peadar Ó Laoghaire,

monuments to his memory will the International Congress of Celtic Studies which he founded in 1959. At its most recent meeting in Cork in 1999, some months before his death, the National University of Ireland, in cooperation with the Congress organisers, marked his achievement by awarding him an honorary degree. Noted for the very high quality of his editorial work, Brian regrettably never edited a volume in the Society's series. However, his advice on new volumes was always eagerly sought and generously
