New publication -Leabhar nua

The most recent publication in the ITS Subsidiary Publications Series, Fled Bricrenn: Reassessments (SS 10), edited by Pádraig Ó Riain, was launched at the 2nd ITS/UCC Seminar on 11 November 2000. The publication, which contains the proceedings of the 1st ITS/UCC Seminar, focuses on the text which forms volume 2 of the Society's Main Series. Fled Bricrend - The Feast of Bricriu, edited by George Henderson. Henderson's edition of this important tale of the Ulster Cycle was first published for the Society in 1899 under the imprint of the publisher, folklorist and Celticist Alfred Nutt, a founder of this Society.

Fled Bricrenn: Reassessments consists of five chapters:

- 'Comparing Fled Bricrenn with Classical Descriptions of Continental Celts: Parallels, Problems and Pitfalls', by Bernhard Maier.
- 'Fled Bricrenn's Significance within the Broader Celtic Context', by John T Koch.
- 'Fled Bricrenn and Sir Gawain and the Green Knight' by Nicolas Jacobs
- 'The Role of Cú Roí in Fled Bricrenn', by Petra S Hellmuth.

'Notes on the Structure and Syntax in Fled Bricrenn', by Proinsias Mac Cana.

The publication also contains a foreword by Pádraig Ó Riain, a bibliography and a general index.

Volumes 4, 8, 9, 15 Foras Feasa ar Éirinn/The History of Ireland

This work, described as "the most influential of all works of Gaelic historiography", was written by Geoffrey Keating between c 1618 and 1634. Drawing upon the annals. medieval texts such as the Lebor Gabála and the Ulster, Fionn, mythological and historical story cycles, it provides an account of the history of Ireland from the earliest times to the coming of the Normans and the death of Rory O'Connor in 1198. Speaking of this work. Professor Breandán Ó Buachalla writes: "Not only did Keating successfully assimilate in one continuous narrative the various strata and components of traditional lore..., but he masterfully recast that narrative in an intelligible modern idiom."

Volumes 42, 45 *Beath Aodha Ruaidh Uí Dhomhnaill/The Life of Aodh Ruadh Ó Domhnaill*

This work was written by Lughaidh Ó Cléirigh, who succeeded his father Maccon as Ollamh to the O'Donnells in 1595, in about 1616. It narrates the events of Red Hugh's life, from his capture and imprisonment in Dublin Castle in 1587 to his death in Spain in 1602. It focuses particularly, however, on the period of the 'Nine Years War', including the battle of Kinsale (1601), seeing in the latter the loss of "the authority and sovereignty of the Gaels of Ireland to the end of time."

Volumes 30, 31, 32, 33 Cinnlae Amhlaoibh Uí Shúileabháin/The Diary of Humphrey O' Sullivan

The author of this diary was a hedge-schoolmaster, antiquarian, manuscript-collector and shopkeeper, living in Callan, co Kilkenny. The diary was written between 1827 and 1835.

Tomás de Bhaldraithe has noted, "the struggle for Catholic Emancipation, the Tithe War, the secret societies, evictions, famine and cholera plagues...are frequently mentioned in the diary. [He] gives regular accounts of markets, prices and wages. He mentions many festival customs, games, sports meetings, patterns, wakes, dances, dinner parties et cetera, in addition to his daily notes on the weather, the crops, bird, animal and plant life, which were among his principal interests."
